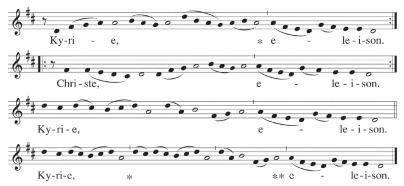

First Reading

1 Kings 19.16b, 19-21

The LORD said to Elijah: "You shall anoint Elisha, son of Shaphat of Abelmeholah, as prophet to succeed you."

Elijah set out and came upon Elisha, son of Shaphat, as he was plowing with twelve yoke of oxen; he was following the twelfth. Elijah went over to him and threw his cloak over him. Elisha left the oxen, ran after Elijah, and said, "Please, let me kiss my father and mother goodbye, and I will follow you." Elijah answered, "Go back! Have I done anything to you?" Elisha left him, and taking the yoke of oxen, slaughtered them; he used the plowing equipment for fuel to boil their flesh, and gave it to his people to eat. For the whole law is fulfilled in one statement, namely, *You shall love your neighbor as yourself*. But if you go on biting and devouring one another, beware that you are not consumed by one another.

I say, then: live by the Spirit and you will certainly not gratify the desire of the flesh. For the flesh has desires against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh; these are opposed to each other, so that you may not do what you want. from the office of readings for the thirteenth subday of the year

Not to preach the Gospel would be my undoing, for Christ himself sent me as his apostle and witness. The more remote, the more difficult the assignment, the more my love of God spurs me on. I am bound to proclaim that Jesus is Christ, the Son of the living God. Because of him we come to know the God we cannot see. He is the firstborn of all creation; in him all things find their being. Man's teacher and redeemer, he was born for us, died for us, and for us he rose from the dead.

All things, all history converges in Christ. A man of sorrow and hope, he knows us and loves us. As our friend he stays by us throughout our lives; at the end of time he will come to be our judge; but we also know that he will be the complete fulfillment of our lives and our great happiness for all eternity.

I can never cease to speak of Christ for he is our truth and our light; *he is the way, the truth and the life.* He is our bread, our source of living water who allays our hunger and satisfies our thirst. He is our shepherd, our leader, our ideal, our comforter and our brother.

He is like us but more perfectly human, simple, poor, humble, and yet, while burdened with work, he is more patient. He spoke on our behalf; he worked miracles; and he founded a new kingdom: in it the poor are happy; peace is the foundation of a life in common; where the pure of heart and those who mourn are uplifted and comforted; the hungry find justice; sinners are forgiven; and all discover that they are brothers.

The image I present to you is the image of Jesus Christ. As Christians you share his name; he has already made most of you his own. So once again I repeat his name to you Christians and I proclaim to all men: Jesus Christ is the beginning and the end, the alpha and the omega, Lord of the new universe, the great hidden key to human history and the part we play in it. He is the mediator – the bridge, if you will – between heaven and earth. Above all he is the Son of man, more perfect than any man, being also the Son of God, eternal and infinite. He is the son of Mary his mother on earth, more blessed than any woman. She is also our mother in the spiritual communion of the mystical body.

Remember: [it] is Jesus Christ I preach day in and day out. His name I would see echo and re-echo for all time even to the ends of the earth.

from the pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

The new fiscal year for our parish will begin on 1 July, so it's time to talk about our finances. For the fiscal year just ending, we have a surplus over our budgeted target, but because of the recent surge in the inflation rate, that surplus has actually all been spent on our higher costs, so we'll break even for the old fiscal year. I am deeply grateful to everyone who contributed during this past year and made it possible for us to pay all of our bills, to assist those in need, to maintain our school, to provide services of many kinds to our people, to help our mission congregation at San Sebastian, and to do our part in sustaining the ministry of our bishop and the Diocese of Charleston. Thank you for your generosity.

I am now completing my 21st year as pastor of Saint Mary's, and in all that time I have never asked for an increase in offertory giving more than 2%. But because of the extraordinary increase in inflation in the last few months, this year I am requesting that each household in the parish increase your contributions by 3%. This means that if you were giving \$50 per week until now, then your new target would be \$51.50. And if you were giving \$125 per week, then your new target is \$128.75, and so on. If everyone makes this adjustment of 3% to all offertory gifts, then we will once again make our budget goal and be able to fulfill all our financial responsibilities.

We are in the final stages of planning for the construction of our new building to serve as a second gym and a center for parish and school events, and I hope to be able to announce soon the date of groundbreaking for that project. As with everything else, the costs for this building have exploded, and we will continue to depend upon the generosity of everyone in the parish family to pay for the new building and all its contents. Once we have a firm budget in place for the entire project, I will be in touch with naming opportunities and will ask for your support.

And even as we begin construction on the new building, we still need your regular help to maintain our campus and existing facilities. Saint Mary's is blessed to have our main campus with eight buildings, the rectory and convent each about five miles from the church, and a guest house near campus which was given to the parish as a residence for visiting clergy and seminarians. Regular upkeep on these buildings and our beautiful green space never gets less expensive, and we do not have endowments which provide financial support for our operations. This means that everything we do is sustained by your gifts to Saint Mary's in three forms: regular offertory to sustain our daily activities, regular capital giving to maintain our buildings and grounds, and periodic capital campaigns to expand or enhance our facilities.

The careful stewardship of time, talent, and treasure is an essential part of authentic Christian discipleship, and I am deeply grateful for your sacrificial commitment to Saint Mary's.
