Dear Friends in Christ,

As I write these words, I am still at home in isolation because of Covid-19, and I am most fortunate to have had the very mildest symptoms. I will return to my regular schedule this weekend and beyond, and I am grateful to everyone for your prayerful support in these days.

As the world approaches a full year of this pandemic, it occurs to me that fear and fatigue have led us to regard other people as the enemies of public health because the virus spreads among us through human hosts. But other people are not our adversaries, and the human race is not a virus. Our enemy in this struggle is the virus itself, and it moves without purpose or plan because it is simply an organism behaving as it must.

Do you remember Fifteen Days to Flatten the Curve? That was the first plan proposed by the federal government last Spring, and its purpose was simple: everyone stay home for two weeks so that we can prevent our hospitals from being overwhelmed by patients needing critical care. And here we are many months later still scrambling to live as normally as possible while contending with a relentless foe.

A few days before I came down with the bug, I was in a store where a woman slapped a man in the face for not wearing a mask. It turns out that he had the mask in his pocket but walked into the store while continuing a conversation on his phone that had begun in his car, thus forgetting to stop and put on his mask. I submit that the fear and contempt reflected in the violent assault on his human dignity is a worse threat to public health than the coronavirus, and that sort of estrangement from each other is something we can prevent in a way that we cannot prevent the spread of the virus.

No power on this planet can prevent the spread of viruses, and we live with them all the time. Some of them make us sick; some of them can kill us. Medical science and public policy can work together to help us fight the diseases that come from viruses, but the idea that we can create a zone of perfect safety is a dangerous illusion. Friends, we are all going to get this virus, and the vaccines now available don't prevent us from being infected by the virus, they simply help our bodies fight off the virus without experiencing the worst symptoms of the disease.

Stay home if you need to. Be mindful of others at all times. Get the vaccine when it becomes available. And live every day with gratitude for the gift of life and respect for all the people around us. Other people are not our adversaries; the virus is, and until last year the human race had never before encountered this threat. But it is here to stay now, and we must all learn to live with it. A good dose of healthy Christian realism is just the medicine we need right now.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The COVID-19 pandemic has disrupted our social, economic, political, and religious lives in ways no one ever imagined. Yet we are not without hope during this time, as people have been working hard for better treatments and now several effective vaccines are available.

The two current vaccines available in the U.S., made by Pfizer and Moderna, have not been derived from the morally tainted fetal stem cell lines. Unfortunately, a fetal stem cell line was utilized for some of the testing of these vaccines. However, after careful examination and consultation with Catholic theologians, scientists, and bioethicists, the Church teaches that it is morally permissible for people to take these vaccines, if others without any connection to these stem cell lines are unavailable. Put most simply, it is not sinful to receive these vaccines.

Catholics also have a duty to make pharmaceutical companies and political leaders know their complete disagreement with developing any vaccine derived in an unethical manner. I call upon each of us to pray and work for the continued development and distribution of safe and effective vaccines that are untainted by involvement or association with abortion.

Lastly, I want to convey the importance of individual discernment as we determine our own healthcare decisions. Certain subsects of our society may be required to vaccinate for the health and safety of those in their care or simply by the nature of their stage of life or health conditions. However, those individuals who are outside the immediate at-risk groups and caregivers, must make a prudential judgment weighting all the factors, such as individual circumstances, responsibilities to the common good and the particular vaccines available. Let us all continue to pray for an end of the pandemic and working for an end to abortion.

Please note that every other pew remains closed to allow for social distancing, and we continue to encourage strongly the wearing of a face mask and careful attention to hand washing and purifying to help reduce the spread of the virus. Our cry rooms remain closed because proper distancing is not possible in those spaces, and for now Confessions are being heard in the cry rooms on Saturday from 3.30 - 4.30 pm. The Wednesday afternoon Holy Hour has returned from 5.00 - 6.00 pm.

Finally, the dispensation from the Sunday obligation remains in force, which means that no one is required to attend Mass, even though all must find a way to keep the Lord's Day holy, and the best way to do that is by joining in the sacred liturgy live-streamed on Sunday morning at 11 am. If you are at risk of the severe symptoms possible from exposure to SARS-CoV-2, then please stay home and join us in prayer remotely.
